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Introduction: About this resource

This sea shanty was collected by Cecil Sharp from Charles Robbins in a workhouse in Marylebone, London in 1909. It is a song that would have been sung on a ship to accompany work. The theme of this shanty, which dates from at least the 1850s, may have been inspired by topical events in the news related to conflicts between the armies of Mexico, commanded by Antonio López de Santa Anna, and the USA commanded by Zachary Taylor, in the Mexican-American War.

This version was created through The Full English, a national project led by the English Folk Dance and Song Society 2013 – 2014 supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund. Primrose Hill Primary School was one of 19 schools across England that worked with folk artists on creative learning projects inspired by The Full English digital archive.

This 3-part harmony arrangement is for SSA (two soprano and one alto part) with piano accompaniment and guitar chords. It is upbeat and catchy with a 1990's UK Garage feel, including a simple rap section, making it particularly appealing for singing by children and young people.

The song words for verse 1, refrain and chorus are traditional. The remaining verses and rap section were written by children from Primrose Hill Primary School with their teacher Katie Teage. The words are about coastal formations and erosion can support learning in the National Curriculum for Geography at Key Stage 2.

Performers: Children from Primrose Hill Primary School, Camden led by their music teacher Katie Teage, with folk artists Hazel Askew (melodeon), Ed Hicks (banjo) and Pete Ord (bass guitar).

Verse 3 All along the headland and the bays *Away Santiana* They both erode by the crash of the waves *All along the plains of Mexico*

Rap section

Don't lay near the bays, or the waves might raise to your face and they might pull you under, that would be a big disgrace to the human race

'cause the waves are loud like thunder wave erosion is beastly, it breaks all the rocks into little tiny pieces so pack up your bags, if you live near the waves your insurance won't pay Hash tag YOLO!

Verse 4

Headlands jut out into the sea *Away Santiana* Caves are formed by the crash of the waves *All along the plains of Mexico*

Arches are formed from the caves Away Santiana Stacks are formed from the arches and cracks All along the plains of Mexico
